A Great Reason to Celebrate at Saint John's Hospice

Friends and supporters gathered together at the SJH parking lot on February 29th, to celebrate the new addition to

the SJH family. Thanks to the generosity of the Maguire Foundation and Catholic Social Services, Saint John's Hospice was able to purchase a new refrigeration truck that will be used to pick up casseroles and donations of clothing and toiletries throughout the Philadelphia and surrounding areas. This gathering was an opportunity to honor those who, through their generosity, made this gift possible. David Stier, SJH Program Director, welcomed the guests and honorees. He spoke of the important role that this truck plays in connecting SJH with its volunteers, the heart and soul of our mission: "Our organization could not function without a vehicle to pick up all of our food and clothing donations. The fact that it was a gift is just incredible!" The Most Reverend Charles Chaput, OFM, Cap, Archbishop of Philadelphia, was present along with James Amato, Secretary for Catholic Human Services. Megan Maguire Nicoletti of the Maguire Foundation, and Amy Holdsmen, (Executive Director of the Maguire Foundation), were also present at the ribbon cutting ceremony. When asked what this event meant to the Maguire Foundation, Ms. Holdsmen replied, "It was a blessing for the Maguire Foundation to participate in the truck dedication. It was readily apparent how integrated

St. John's Hospice staff and volunteers are in the lives and spirits of the people that they serve."

On an average day, SJH serves 57 casseroles to hundreds of residents and day services guests. Casseroles are prepared by a dedicated family of volunteers from forty-seven parishes in the area. They donate the food and thousands of hours each year to ensure that SJH is able to carry out its mission of feeding the homeless and poor. The casseroles are picked up by SJH driver, Mike D'Ambrosio. Mike spends many hours on the road driving, picking up these donations. He knows the importance of a dependable vehicle to get his job done: "Although my work, at times, is physically demanding, having a new truck that is reliable makes my job that much better. I am extremely grateful to the Maguire Foundation and CSS for this very generous gift."

The Workers' Compensation Section of the Philadelphia Bar Association continued their ongoing support of SJH by presenting a generous donation. Fr. Dennis Witalec of Epiphany Parish and Fr. John Daya, OFM, Cap. of St. John the Evangelist Parish were present to bless the truck, its driver and all SJH volunteers, past and present. The Saint Mary Interparochial School Choir provided entertainment for the event. A reception catered by *Tootsie's Salad Express* followed afterwards in the Saint John's Hospice dining hall.

From Saint John's Hospice Program Director



We can experience this Year of Mercy more fully by reflecting on our own personal encounters with mercy. Exploring this with any degree of seriousness requires courage and commitment. Many of our residents had the opportunity to do this while on retreat at Malvern Retreat House in May.

I was humbled and challenged by some of their reflections, particularly as they focused on personal examples of forgiveness. I wasn't surprised to hear about the depth of pain and trauma that our men had experienced in life, although this is never easy to hear; but I was challenged by their stories of how they have responded to these troubles. If I had experienced those same hardships, would I have been able to respond with the same level of grace? What if more of my life experiences were similar to theirs? Would I be homeless too?

Understandably, people who come into contact with St. John's Hospice often express their struggle to understand homelessness. How does one come to be homeless? How does a person get out of it? These are hard questions to answer. Surely the truest answers vary as much as each individual life story. What traumas, circumstances, and choices has each person experienced? Whether homeless or not, we each have our own version of the story, even though some of us appear to be more fortunate than others.

The commonality is brokenness, whether we live on the streets, or at St. John's Hospice, or in a lovely home. We are all broken. Many of our most ardent supporters have a deep awareness of this shared brokenness. Some have told us directly. Maybe they saw the pain in a man's eyes when he walked through our lunch line, or perhaps they felt the struggles of a family member who experienced homelessness. Undoubtedly, every volunteer and every supporter has experienced compassion for another human being. All have shared in that same unity that we experienced on retreat.

Our men feel your compassion, and many of them express their gratitude for it – for you – on a daily basis as they pass through or dwell within the shelter of St. John's Hospice and Good Shepherd.

Thank you for not turning away from our shared brokenness.

Thank you for being an instrument of mercy.

Pop-Up Restaurant Provides Hope For the Homeless

Entrepreneur Jason Pinaro founded Pop-Up Philly, an event providing food, clothing and support for the homeless of Philadelphia. On February 28th, the Armory on 23rd street was transformed into a beautiful restaurant. SJH residents joined over 160 members of the homeless community to share in the event. Jason was inspired to create this pop-up event in response to the homeless he encountered daily on the streets of Philadelphia. Jason started a campaign on GoFundMe, raising over \$13,000 in just three days. He also reached out to CSS and SJH for support. Kris Jaeger, Director of Development & Community Relations for SJH says, "When Jason told us about his plan for the pop-up, we were more than happy to do whatever we could to make his vision a reality. After seeing how many people were inspired and uplifted by this event, it

was apparent that it was well worth the effort." By the day of the event, Jason had raised over \$20,000. Twenty-five local vendors donated their time, goods, and services. Cescaphe Event Group provided the dinner for the evening, serving lobster bisque, Caprese salad, braised short rib over creamy polenta, and hand-filled cannoli for all to enjoy. Twenty dollar Visa gift cards were distributed to each guest present, along with gift bags filled with toiletries and prizes. Clothing was available for all the guests as well. Jason is already working on another event scheduled to happen in the fall of 2016. SJH plans to work along with Jason once again to make this event possible. Thank you Jason, for your dedication and compassion as you continue to serve the homeless community of Philadelphia. "My goal is to give somebody hope. If we feed 150 people and just one person walks away with a sense of hope, then that \$20,000 is worth it."

A Small Act of Kindness Makes a Big Difference

In the mid-eighties, Jim and Flo Wheatly spent most of their time traveling between their home in rural Pennsylvania and Sloan-Kettering hospital in Manhattan. They were getting much needed care for their son who was diagnosed with pediatric non-Hodgkin's lymphoma. Like many people, Flo typically, was quick to turn her head from a homeless person in need. One day that all changed. While on a street corner in NYC, Flo's son became sick from his recent treatment. Crowds of people pushed by with no one offering to help. Just then, a rugged man reached out to them, grabbed their suitcase, helped them onto the subway and then to a cab that would eventually get them to their

destination. When they parted, Flo was overcome with gratitude. She gave the man five dollars. He turned to Flo and said, "Don't abandon me." From that day on she knew that there was something more to be done to help the needy. Years after that meeting, Flo could not forget the strangers words. She went home one night and took out her sewing machine and gathered some scraps of material from her past sewing projects. The final product was a sleeping bag. This small act of kindness was the beginning of something much bigger than Flo could have ever imagined. Flo and her husband Jim began passing the sleeping bags out to the homeless on the streets of NYC. Word of their ministry spread and soon groups began sending sleeping bags to the family to distribute. In response, Flo started My Brother's Keeper, a non-profit organization that makes and distributes blankets to homeless people in the U.S. and abroad. Now, more than 6,000 sleeping bags are distributed all over the country annually by the organization. Twice a year, My Brother's Keeper visits SJH, bringing a truck filled with nearly 100 sleeping bags, each containing packs of toiletries inside.

A Time Away to Reflect and Refresh

On May 18-19, the beautiful rolling hills of Malvern Retreat Center was the setting for the 2016 Retreat for Men in Transition. Each year SJH residents, day and coffee house guests, and staff enjoy an overnight retreat consisting of talks, prayer, reflection and food. This year, the theme was *Make Me a Channel of Mercy*, featuring keynote speaker Fr. Joe Corley. Resident Marc M. says of the experience, "I felt very relaxed—it was nice to get involved with everyone. The sharing and comraderie was great." The topics discussed during the retreat focused on mercy and forgiveness. A great time was had by all.



Spotlight on SJH Resident



SJH resident, Nate found himself at Saint John's after a series of traumatic experiences. For seven years he dedicated all of his time to taking care of his mother; he did not want to have to put her in a home. The deaths of his mother and brother brought him into hard times. After their passing, Nate had to take care of all of the funeral arrangements and was soon left with nothing. He came to Saint John's looking for a way to build himself back up. While residing at SJH, Nate found employment and is working on acquiring housing. "Saint John's provided me with a safe haven, a means of getting back on my feet, and resources to acquire employment and housing. Many people on the staff have become like family members." During the construction of a new HVAC system, the SJH dining room had to remain closed for three days. Over 900 meals would not be served to those in need and hundreds would not receive services that they have come to rely upon. From Avoiding Detentions to Making a Difference

When asked how he came to know SJH, long-time volunteer David DiRenzo’s story is unlike any other. DiRenzo is a graduate of Cardinal Dougherty High School, where he acquired quite a few demerits. The discipline office had a policy where students could choose service to pare down their infractions. As Dave recalls, “That’s when I was given the opportunity to work at Saint John’s Hospice, which at the time was run by the Little Brothers of the Good Shepherd.” Dave remembers, “‘*Back in the day*’ we cooked, prepared and served meals. From what I remember, it was quite an undertaking. The old saying that God works in mysterious ways certainly applied. I fell in love with Saint John’s – a love affair that remains through today.” DiRenzo can still be found on any given day of the week serving our men in the dining hall.
