When he heard of Saint John's Hospice, "Tom" had low expectations. He knew that resources for men in Philadelphia were few and expected a hard time securing any real support. He first began coming for nightly services before transitioning to residential services weeks later. Now, a SJH Resident Alumni, he remembers everything being easier and smoother than he ever imagined. He soon realized there was a plethora of institutional support at SJH. Tom fondly recalls management, staff, bunkmates, and roommates who he approached with positivity. He says, "I never veered from my true self. I was able to retain my own sense of self." Tom's advice for current SJH residents is to take advantage of the good people and structure at SJH to ultimately reintegrate into independent living. After an experience he describes as "smooth sailing", Tom made the seamless transition to living alone offsite. He received assistance with the apartment search and leasing from case workers and other SJH staff. Tom shared, "Thank you doesn't begin to convey the gratitude I have. The staff here were and are in my corner".

Thanks to All Who Made This Year's Boot Up Philly a Success!

We were honored to receive more than 800 people at the 3rd annual event held on November 4th. Over 80 volunteers arrived at the Cathedral of Saints Peter and Paul parking lot in downtown Philadelphia in the early hours of the morning to help prepare for what was an amazing day for all involved.

Boot Up Philly—an annual event organized by Saint John's Hospice (SJH) Shelter and Day Services Program—provides free new coats, boots, socks, underwear, and other cold weather essentials to individuals and families experiencing homelessness and impacted by poverty. With support from the SJH Board, Catholic Social Services, and The Order of Malta in Philadelphia, several months of planning culminated in an event that benefits thousands of people. There was music provided by Philadelphia Metro Entertainment Group as well as food and activities for families—all contributing to a block party feel. "It was important to us that guests felt like they were having a fun shopping experience" replies Kris Jaeger, SJH Director of Development and Community Relations. Volunteers greeted people as they were given bags filled with new winter essentials.

Many of the items distributed were made possible by sponsors and donations from organizations in Philadelphia and beyond including Independence Blue Cross, WSFS, Knights of Columbus Council 1911 and Knock Knock Give a Sock, a nonprofit out of NYC that generously donated over 4,000 pairs of socks for the event. In addition, many items were donated from organizations that held drives in the weeks leading up to the event such as St. Mary's Interparochial School where K-8th graders collected socks and underwear, and St. Dominic Parish, who used their Boot Up drive as a kick-off in celebration of their 175th anniversary celebration. The event also served as a great platform to educate visitors on the other archdiocesan services and ministries, such as Nutritional Development





Services, the Communities of Don Guanella and Divine Providence, and Visitation Homes.
